

Women's History Month

Women's History Month is here. Why is studying women's history so important for our students?

Completes our history lessons. Many writers of historical documents and textbooks were men, which has resulted in women's voices and experiences being left out of many historical documents and therefore our history lessons.

Emphasis on women's history fills the information gap and adds more perspectives to essential events.

Builds students' confidence. Students who see themselves represented as accomplished women from history can build confidence in their abilities. Women's history lessons motivate students to challenge themselves in new ways.

Encourages critical thinking. In the age of unlimited access to information, students need to be able to evaluate information and apply that information to their relevant situations. Lessons on women in history bring more perspectives to the table and teach students to think critically about sources, information, and decisions.





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
